#### A Word from the President

#### Why Range Safety Rules

The WSC has seven Range Safety Rules. Why seven and not five or maybe nine? Which safety rules are the most important? Good questions all. The NRA has the three "Always" safety rules and the Arizona Game and Fish Department has the TAB+1 rules they teach at Hunter Education classes. Which are right? The reality is they are <u>all</u> right. It is just a matter of preference by individual groups. Training instills good habits.

The #7 safety rule for the WSC is: "Be sure of your target and what is beyond it". Now some might question why that safety rule is appropriate on a "controlled" shooting range. Isn't it more appropriate to hunting situations? Learned habits, good and bad, will always surface during times of stress. Safe handling of firearms cannot be a part time effort—we must always treat firearms as if our lives or others depend on them. Knowing your target and what lies beyond is obviously quite important in any hunting situation. But what about a situation where one is forced to employ your firearm in a self-defense situation—say within the confines of your home. Just how important is it to know what lies beyond your target?

Training instills good habits. Practice determining what is 'down range' or 'what is your backstop' every time you shoot. This is important as you subconsciously revert to 'learned behavior' in times of stress.

We all need to practice knowing 'what is beyond our target' at WSC also. There are numerous wooden blocks on the range designed to be used to prevent your target stands from tipping over in the wind and to protect the metal target stands. There is also the 100 yard steel gong target. Anytime active targets are placed at shorter distances, it is important that each shooter take a look downrange to see what might be beyond the intended target.

Recently the horizontal support mechanism for the 100 yard gong target needed some repair and 32 bullet holes were discovered in the horizontal support structure. The target gong hangs at least 14 inches below this support pipe. So just how did so many holes occur? It most probably was a consequence of shooters not checking what was beyond their close in targets.

An old crusty Range Master once told me, "anything down range will get shot"—and guess that will always be true, but the requirement of determining what lies 'downrange' as a common practice, and even on a "controlled" range like ours, instills a habit that if the time should ever come in a critical self-defense situation, we will instinctively act and look beyond our target. Even if it is for a brief second, because what lies beyond in this situation could very well be a family member.

## **Partial Range Shooting Area Restriction**

Until further notice the newly expanded pistol use area that is adjacent to and north of the existing rifle range ramadas is closed to shooting.

An unintended consequence was discovered in the character of materials utilized in the building of the new pistol area impact berm. At the conclusion of grading it was realized that the materials used at the time were comprised of an unacceptable level of rock material. This presents an increased ricochet hazard potential.

So, what is the fix? To mitigate this risk a more suitable materiel needs to be acquired and faced onto the existing berm. Efforts are underway to locate and deliver materiel with a much finer composition to the Range. In the meantime, this area is closed for use.

Thanks for your attention to this important issue and efforts to keep our Range safe.

#### **Sporting Clays Update**

Fellow scatter gunners: Last month's newsletter told you about our ongoing effort to find the correct combination of operable machines and clays to provide a consistent launching platform for our sporting clays operation. Good news---We think we are there!

It appears that the biggest issue with premature clay breakage was that our existing inventory of clays was dated, had been subjected to various climate extremes, and generally was not up to the task of being launched from our throwing machines. We ordered some new, more robust clays that are performing very well for us. Testing shows they have a very high launch success rate. That said, they also tend to be somewhat more difficult to turn into small pieces by the trigger person due to their being a little "tougher". So that means we all have one more excuse to fall back on when the occasional clay seems to just float unscathed to the ground.

Now we just need the weather to cooperate. The 30 plus inches of snow has shut down the clays range until further notice. The access road needs to dry out as does the range itself. The sun and warmer weather in the last few days has helped with this situation nicely but there is

certainly more winter ahead. In the meantime, as we wait for conditions to improve, we still need those interested WSC members to contact us at wscaz2020@hotmail.com and let us know your availability, how many shooters, days of the week, and the times that work best.
