It's Membership Renewal Time

The Medic's Corner - by Annette Perkins, BSN-RN-BC

Once again, our own RSO Adal presented an amazing "Stop the Bleed" course for 17 attendees. The training took place at the "Shed" in Williams on 7 December 2022. It is good to remember that after six months, we only remember approximately 60% of what we've learned. This makes reviewing and practicing the principles and methods of "Stop the Bleed" a priority!

Not everyone will always be available to attend training in person. Life gets busy. The American College of Surgeons' "Stop the Bleed" program has an online training course with videos, which is an excellent option for those unable to attend the in-person training. I encourage everyone to check out the" Stop the Bleed" website at: https://www.stopthebleed.org/

A personal first aid kit may be as simple as gloves and a tourniquet, adding duct tape, shears, and a small roll of Kerlex gauze gives the individual added tools in an emergency. These items can be carried in a baggie on your person (the best place to carry) or in a purse or backpack. The most essential piece of equipment (after putting on gloves) for stopping an arterial bleed on a limb is a tourniquet. When applied properly it will stop the bleeding. Keep in mind our bodies have approximately 5 liters of blood circulating through our body. It only takes 3-5 minutes for an arterial bleed to drop the amount of circulating blood to half that amount. The injured person will die from the loss of blood. How do we know if the bleeding is from an artery? If a bleed is: Squirting, Spurting, Soaking, or Pooling, apply a tourniquet, above the limb wound until there is no further blood loss. Once a tourniquet is placed Never remove it! A

tourniquet may remain in place for 6 hours, use a sharpie to write "T" for the tourniquet and the time it was placed somewhere on the patient. Tourniquets can only be applied to arms or legs, for other arterial bleeds direct pressure should be applied to the wound and held until Emergency Services arrive. Kerlex gauze can be packed into a wound and aids in clot formation use your gloved finger to apply direct pressure to the artery and pack (tightly). Once the wound is packed with gauze use duct tape to secure the bandage. The shears are nice for removing clothing that may be obscuring the source of bleeding. Chest Seals are used for chest wounds to prevent air from entering the chest cavity and potentially, creating life-threatening conditions such as Tension Pneumothorax. They are easy to use but it is wise to learn how to use them properly. If you carry these items, get proper training. Attend a "Stop the Bleed" course, these classes are FREE and take the whole family! The even simpler solution is to visit the" Stop the Bleed"

Where to purchase items for your kit? It is important to note that many tourniquets are made cheaply and do not function well. I recommend two online businesses that only sell recommended Gen 7 C-A-T tourniquets which are made in the USA vs the knockoff made in China.

North American Rescue @ https://www.narerescue.com this company sells individual items and pre-made kits. One C-A-T tourniquet retails for \$29.99. They also sell premade kits however, putting your kit together is more reasonable.

The Tactical Medic @ https://thetacticalmedic.com is a company located in Mesa, Arizona. This site offers many items that make carrying a personal first aid kit easy.

My personal favorite is the AFAK (ankle first aid kit) by Ryker nylon. It retails for \$60 unstocked. A stocked AFAK runs \$100. I'm not a fan of the tourniquet included in the stocked AFAK. The C-A-T Gen 7 tourniquet that is available retails for \$37. Mini-shears 3 ½ in. are \$1 and Trauma shears are \$5.95. If you need items shipped, you will have to arrange this feature. The Hy Fin Vent Compact Chest Seal Twin Pack is great for chest wounds and retails @ \$20.





Now before all you Tom Selleck fans descend on the Range for an autograph it was just his rifle that was at the range. More precisely it was an exact twin of the rifle Tom Selleck used in the movie "Quigley Down Under." While the rifle was made famous by Hollywood in 1990, it was really in 1874 when it proved what it could do as recounted in "The Shot of the Century." It was made by buffalo hunter Billy Dixon at Adobe Walls, a small trading post on the South Canadian River in the Texas Panhandle. Dixon and a handful of other buffalo hunters had been under siege for three days by a massive force of between 700-1,200 Comanche, Kiowa, and Cheyenne warriors who'd united in a bloody effort to drive out the invaders from their hunting grounds. Behind those walls, Dixon fought for his life alongside 27 other men and one woman. On the last day Billy Dixon shot an Indian off his horse at a distance later surveyed to be 1,538 yards. This impressive feat ended the siege.
