

#### **Range Improvement Project**

#### **Target Frames – by Keith Heimes**

As of now all the wooden target frames in the target locker have the 48" verticals with the cardboard stapled so the top rises to approximately 54". The remaining 48" verticals in the conex are to be used up before we transition to the 54" verticals.

From this point forward all new verticals made should be cut to 54" high and 3/4" wide. If anyone has some scrap 2X4 or 2X6 lumber that is reasonably straight and you want to donate it to the Club, just drop if off at the Range and I'll take it from there.

Also please ensure that the 8"X8" wooden blocks are placed in front of the metal target frames to reduce inadvertent bullet impact damage.

# Steel Cartridge Case "Picker Upper" available at Range – by Bruce Speirs



For those of you who shoot steel cased ammo we have a magnetic "picker upper" in the RSO box. Whoever donated it our ageing backs say "Thank you!"

And remember <u>all shooters are required</u> by our USFS permit to <u>pick up their brass</u> after shooting. As the saying goes "Your mother doesn't work here so pick up after yourself" and it is NOT the job of the RSOs to do so.

#### **Tactical Tips** – by Bruce Speirs

Your Self Defense Weapon and You - A few years back an acquaintance of mine was bragging (and he bragged about everything!) about what a great self-defense handgun he had. It was a

high end Kimber .45ACP semiautomatic pistol. I found this absurdly paradoxical as even though his wife regularly carried a pistol he rarely, if ever, did. I asked him where it was to which he replied "It lives in the gun safe." With a slight smirk and a great deal of inner satisfaction I told him "Your Kimber is worthless!" He gasped and became red. I said that 'if the pistol is always in the safe it can't be a self-defense weapon' and he 'might as well sell it.' He did not take this well.

What's the point here? To be effective it must be available and ready for immediate use. That requires that it functions, is maintained, is loaded, and the operator is familiar and experienced shooting and reloading it, and it is usually carried or immediately available. In other words you need to 'talk the talk' and (contrary to the braggart above) 'walk the walk.' Have your pistol ready and be experienced in its operation. Besides just shooting practice, do magazine changes until it becomes natural. I was taught that if in a gun fight to be assertive and that "If you are not shooting you should be moving. If you are not moving you should be reloading. If you are not doing any of that you're &%#@?ed." Go to the Range and shoot a box!

**Fall is Here = Dusk Lighting Conditions** – So what's up? Notice that the summer sun is not out to 8 PM anymore? - That's what! And as the days move further into winter it will be getting darker sooner. So why is that important? To see you need light, conversely, to see – and shoot effectively – you <u>need</u> effective light. That means you must have a readily available and capable flashlight. You need a gun for a gun fight and you need that plus light for a night gun fight! You'll probably never need it to shoot but finding the door lock at night is a good thing.

My Glock has 'rails' so I can slip on a Streamlight weapon light. Or sometimes I also carry a small 'tactical' type pocket flashlight. You carry a pocket knife? Get a flashlight!

These new lights are not your grandfather's old D cell camping flashlight. These have high intensity LED or Xenon bulbs and are quite bright. But they cost more but you are getting more too! The old "You get what you pay for" come true. In the future I'll write up an article on these things but in the meantime at least get a good tactical type flashlight.

#### This month - Recognizing the signs and symptoms of a stroke

One of the easiest methods to remember what to look for is the acronym: **F.A.S.T.** 

According to the American Stroke Association, "Strokes are the 5<sup>th</sup> cause of death and a leading cause of disability in the United States. On average 19 million brain cells die every minute that a stroke goes untreated. Stroke is an Emergency and 911 must be called immediately."

The sooner signs and symptoms of a stroke are recognized do not delay in calling 911. "Early treatment of strokes leads to higher survival rates and lower disability rates."

#### Lock, Stock & Barrel Trivial Pursuit - Does length matter!?!

**Question** – I have two .30-06 rifles, one has a 22" barrel the other a 24" barrel. Will one give me better accuracy and ballistics?

Answer - Longer barrels are generally not more accurate. If anything, it's quite the opposite as shorter, stiffer barrels tend to vibrate more consistently and are probably more accurate on average. And who shoots rifles using only iron sights anymore? Optical sights vastly improve YOUR accuracy. Case in point about 20+ years ago the Marines were considering a wholesale replacement of the M16A2 rifle with the M4 carbine, which would have reduced the rifle's 20-inch barrel to the M4's 14.5-inch tube. The obvious loss of velocity, and thus reduced energy and effective range, concerned many. This was before the Marines had fully embraced optical sights, and the concern was based on the loss of the riflemen's accuracy using iron battle sights with the M4's much shorter sight radius. The Marine riflemen kept the longer barrel but then that changed in 2015 when optics arrived and, as influenced by urban combat conditions, they switched to the M-4 with the Trijicon ACOG (Advanced Combat Optical Gunsight) 4x32 fixed power compact riflescope with a dual-illuminated reticle (tritium and fiber optics).

As far as ballistics first consider velocity. Longer barrels generate higher velocity because the propellant burns more completely. However, there are diminishing returns with extra-long barrels, depending on cartridge, caliber and propellant. It is often said we can expect a velocity change of about 20 to 25 fps per inch of barrel loss. This is approximate, but not far off, if we start with an "average" barrel of about 23 inches. Most factory ballistics are based on 24-inch barrels so if you have a 22-inch barrel, you probably aren't achieving published velocities. Most non-magnum cartridges do fine with 22-inch barrels so don't worry about it. Most magnum cartridges do well with 24-inch barrels. They may do better with 26-inch barrels, but is there any game animal or target that will recognize a difference of 100 fps?


